

From Pastor Kleinschmidt

Some words you say in church and in prayers and you have never given them a second thought. In fact, you may not even be sure what they mean. You say them so often that they have lost any original meaning and now they are just filler. More than likely the word 'Amen' is like that.

Amen is typically added to the end of prayers or blessings. It is a Hebrew word that means faith or faithfulness. Amen is one of those unique Hebrew words that has followed the Gospel into every language in which it has been preached. It is not translated, it is just transliterated. Of this word that ends the Lord's Prayer, Martin Luther wrote in the Small Catechism, "This means that I should be certain that these petitions are pleasing to our Father in heaven, and are heard by Him; for He Himself has commanded us to pray in this way and has promised to hear us. Amen, amen means 'Yes, yes, it shall be so.'"

Jesus uses this word also. In John's Gospel he uses a double amen. In the ESV translation this is translated as "Truly, truly..." What Jesus is teaching is that what he will say next is a truth that will confront those who do not understand His message or doubt him. It is way of saying that he is the truth and what he speaks is the truth...whether we think it is or not.

When amen is added to the end of the prayer it is you saying that you are sure that God will hear you and answer you according to His Divine will.

Another way amen is used is at the end of prayers or blessings at church. I speak some words at church by myself and the congregation adds their amen to those words. For example, the Invocation is like this. "In the Name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit." The congregation then adds, "Amen." What you are doing is claiming those words as your own and saying they belong to you and all the blessings they bestow are yours. Your amen is like your hand reaching out to God and

receiving all that He has to give. It grabs onto those words that are spoken by me and makes them your own.

There are other times that Amen is the appropriate response at the end of something I say. At the beginning of the sermon, "Grace, mercy, and peace... and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ." Amen is the response of the congregation and not my response. Or another example would at Communion when I say, "The Body of Christ for your forgiveness", you say "Amen." This is your declaration that "Yes, yes, Jesus is for me!" Or at the dismissal, "Now the Body and Blood of your Lord and Savior Jesus Christ strengthen and preserve you until life everlasting. Depart in His Peace with your sins forgiven." The response is a hearty and loud "Amen!" You are saying, "Yes, my sins are

forgiven and my faith is strengthened and I have been fed with the medicine of eternal life!"

Martin Chemnitz was a 16th Century Lutheran who helped to write the Book of Concord. He says a similar thing

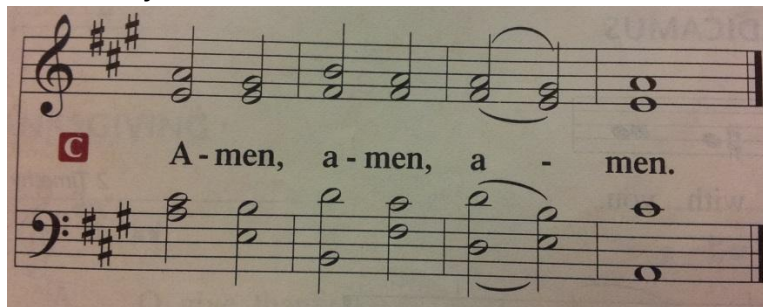
about Amen. "Prayers and invocations are ended with this expression, not only to show that in a general way we approve of the prayer but also that it may be applied to us personally."

Basically, the Amen at church is your opportunity to be an enthusiastic participant in the service and to apply the words that are being said to you and declaring them to be true.

Years ago I stopped saying Amen during the service because it is your response to give. I don't want to take away from you what is properly your word to say. In this way I hope to show you that you are not an inactive observer, but an active listener and receiver of all that God has to give you during the Service.

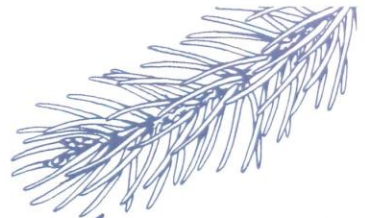
A LETTER FROM OUR SEMINARIAN

Hello friends in Christ, I cannot believe I have already been serving as a vicar for five months. As we begin this new Church Year with Advent, I wanted to update you on what I have been doing during my vicarage these last couple of months. Vicarage truly has been a great experience. Here at Zion I have had the privilege to preach every other week, lead a midweek Bible study on 1 Kings, and walk the congregation through the Nicene Creed on Sunday mornings. On top of this, there have been many opportunities to witness other pastoral acts. I have observed five funerals and have been regularly visiting our more than thirty shut-ins.
